Agriculture and Agri-Food Processing

With our position in a major irrigation district and access to high-quality water, Lethbridge is a hub for value-added food production. Research and innovation in agriculture are supported by the University of Lethbridge and Lethbridge Polytechnic, making the city a leader in agri-food technology and processing.

Manufacturing

Our \$1.2 billion in manufacturing exports in 2022 highlights the strength of this sector. Companies like Pratt & Whitney, Flexahopper Plastics, and Southland Trailers thrive here due to our skilled trades workforce, proximity to the U.S. border, and connections via the CANAMEX trade corridor and CPKC rail.

Lethbridge's strategic location on Canada's Western Gateway Trade & Logistics Corridor provides seamless access to North American markets. Being just an hour from Alberta's only 24/7 commercial border crossing at Coutts gives businesses a logistical edge.

Lethbridge is a well-connected logistics hub with robust transportation infrastructure that makes it easy for businesses to move goods and access markets:

Road Access: Lethbridge is strategically located on the CANAMEX trade corridor, linking Canada, the U.S., and Mexico via Highway 4/I-15. We're just one hour north of Alberta's only 24/7 commercial border crossing at Coutts/Sweetgrass, providing seamless access to U.S. markets. Ongoing upgrades to twin Highway 3 will enhance connectivity to the Trans-Canada Highway, improving access to eastern and western Canada.

Rail Access: Lethbridge is served by the CPKC rail line, providing direct connections across Canada, the U.S., and Mexico. This efficient rail network gives businesses the ability to ship goods across North America with ease.

Air Access: Lethbridge has a regional airport for business travel, while Calgary International Airport, a major cargo and passenger hub, is just a two-hour drive away. Calgary's airport provides global reach for businesses needing international air freight services.


Our strategic location and multimodal transport options make Lethbridge a prime choice for businesses requiring efficient access to local, national, and international markets.

This ensures projects can be adapted to meet business needs while adhering to local planning objectives.

Customized Solutions: The City is open to collaborating with businesses to address unique project requirements. Our planning and development team is proactive in finding solutions, whether through conditional approvals, zoning amendments, or tailored agreements.

Lethbridge has a strong and growing talent pipeline supported by a combination of educational institutions, immigration programs, and a high quality of life that attracts and retains skilled workers:

Post-Secondary Institutions: The University of Lethbridge and Lethbridge College graduate approximately 3,500 students annually in fields such as agriculture, business, sciences, trades, and technology. These institutions are key sources of young, skilled professionals for local industries.

Regional Workforce: As a regional service hub with a trade catchment population of 341,000, Lethbridge draws talent from neighbouring communities and municipalities, creating a diverse and highly interconnected labour pool.

Immigration Support: Lethbridge participates in the Alberta Advantage Immigration Program, allowing local employers to fast-track immigration for skilled workers. This program is particularly valuable for addressing specialized workforce needs.



Talent



Lethbridge is home to two world-class institutions: the University of Lethbridge and Lethbridge Polytechnic. Together, they offer a wide range of programs in fields like agriculture, business, trades, technology, and sciences, graduating approximately 3,500 students annually. These institutions provide customized training and workforce development opportunities to meet business needs.

Lethbridge is home to two world-class institutions, the University of Lethbridge and Lethbridge College, which together graduate approximately 3,500 students annually in fields like agriculture, business, trades, technology, and sciences. This ensures a steady supply of skilled talent for local industries.

As of September 2024, the Lethbridge CMA's unemployment rate stood at 5.1%, the lowest in the Prairies. Manufacturing and other services have shown recent growth, while sectors like healthcare have faced challenges.

The labour force participation rate in Lethbridge is 67.9%, which reflects a healthy level of workforce engagement.

Notable Statistics

The region has strong employment in sectors like manufacturing, accommodation, food services, healthcare, and construction, with significant year-over-year growth in accommodation and food services.

Environmental, Social and Governance

Lethbridge is committed to environmental sustainability through several key initiatives:

Waste Diversion: The City's Business Waste Diversion Strategy aims to reduce business waste by 45% by 2030. There are mandatory recycling and organics programs for businesses, and residential programs like composting, blue cart recycling, and yard waste diversion are widely implemented.

Energy Efficiency: The City has completed several energy efficiency projects, including LED lighting retrofits at facilities like the ENMAX Centre, Crossings Ice Complex, and City Hall. Additionally, the City has conducted energy audits for its water and wastewater treatment plants, contributing to a reduction in corporate energy consumption.

Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emission Reduction: Lethbridge has achieved a 16.9% reduction in corporate GHG emissions since 2018. Initiatives contributing to this reduction include the landfill gas capture system, increased waste diversion, facility retrofits, and greening the City's fleet.

Tree Planting and Urban Forestry: In 2023, over 350 trees were planted, including 43 cottonwoods for a Native Cottonwood Project. The City's Urban Forestry team also conducted inspections and treatments for Dutch Elm Disease, ensuring the health of public trees.

Stormwater Management: The City has focused on improving water quality and biodiversity, such as installing wetland plants at Sunridge Stormwater Pond and utilizing floating islands donated by Environment Lethbridge to improve water quality at Paradise Canyon.

These initiatives highlight Lethbridge's commitment to sustainability and its efforts to reduce its environmental impact across waste, energy, emissions, and natural resources.



Lethbridge is committed to fostering a diverse, equitable, and inclusive community. Key DEI initiatives include:

Indigenous Relations: The City acknowledges its location on the traditional lands of the Blackfoot people and pays respect to their cultural heritage, beliefs, and relationship with the land. Efforts focus on reconciliation and recognizing the Métis Nation of Alberta, Region III.

Cultural Awareness: The City promotes inclusivity through public engagement, cultural events, and educational programs. This includes celebrating diverse communities, such as Indigenous Peoples Day, and fostering a deeper understanding of cultural traditions and histories.

Support for Newcomers: Lethbridge offers various settlement services to support immigrants and refugees, such as language programs, community orientation, and integration initiatives, helping newcomers establish roots in the community.

Inclusive Policies: Local policies ensure equal access to services, with a focus on accessible public spaces, facilities, and transportation options for people with disabilities, as well as providing programming for underrepresented groups.
